

## PROBATION SCAM ALERT

Scammers may target you because you or a family member are on probation or required to register as an offender.

In a typical scam call, an impostor, posing as a court employee or law enforcement officer, may threaten you with arrest or offer to release someone from jail.

## Here are the facts:

- Scammers may pose as court officials or law enforcement to scare victims into paying a fine to avoid a bogus arrest.
- Real law enforcement officers NEVER tell people they are on the way to arrest them. Real officers NEVER tell people they can pay to avoid an arrest.
- Legitimate government agencies do NOT call you for payment or accept payments in money wires, gaming apps, gift cards, or Bitcoin.
- Do not respond to calls, texts, or emails that threaten you with arrest or legal action.
- Don't trust Caller ID displays scammers may spoof them. If you're really worried, you can contact the agencies listed below.
- Don't automatically answer or call back unknown callers. Let them go to voicemail.
- Don't be fooled if a caller asks you to go to the Justice Center. It's a scam tactic to trick you.
